Astronomy (Mrs. Stuebner): In this survey class, students will explore the solar system, various types of stars, and other features of the universe. They will also learn about the interactions between these objects, and about the tools used to study them.

Computers (Mr. Castillo): Based on student interest (determined through later conversations), this class could include coding and databases, web design and development, digital graphic design, advanced spreadsheets, databases, multimedia editing and animation, and/or maintenance and computer repair.

Core Fitness (F) (Mr. Barker): Participants will be introduced to the many benefits of physical fitness, with a special emphasis on strengthening their core. By using various strength and conditioning techniques, such as stretching, resistance, circuit, endurance and weight training, each activity will be used to help develop their overall physical fitness and core strength. This class is ideal for students desiring to strengthen their body for sports activities or just for general health. Female students only.

Creative Writing (Mr. Link): This elective course feeds upon students' creative instincts to write in both poetry and prose. The teacher provides directed inspiration and explanatory lectures on form, rhythm, and style. The course is ultimately dependent upon the students' own work in their writing portfolios.

History of Media and Technology (Miss Cole): The history of the media and technology will discuss some of the most significant events in communication history—including the development of media technology, the media industry itself, and its role and influence in society. We will analyze the changes in different types of media from print to film, especially the representation of faith and Christianity.

Music: Introduction to Guitar (Mrs. Barker): Beginner-level guitar class; includes learning worship songs; plan on having your own guitar that you can bring to school each week.

Music: Introduction to Piano (Mrs. Barker): Beginner-level piano class; includes learning worship songs; you need to have a keyboard or piano available for practicing outside of class.

Music: Vocal Ensemble (singing) (Mrs. Barker): Includes choir music, vocal pedagogy, worship and music theory.

Two Dimensional Art & Textile Explorations (Mrs. Starkenburg): In this course students will explore many different methods of creating art using two dimensional compositions based in pencil, colored pencil, charcoal, printmaking, acrylic and watercolor paints. The vast majority of class time will be spent creating art.

Students will define and analyze digital platforms and devices while learning the skills to design and create graphics, audio/video content, applications, and advertising for education and other activities.
